

Spotlight

Jesus Christ (c. 4 BC – c. AD 30) was a spiritual Teacher, who preached a gospel of faith, love and forgiveness. His life and teachings led to the emergence of a new religion – Christianity, which became the dominant religious force in the western world.

The Christian religion reveres Jesus Christ as the Son of God. Jesus is also an important prophet in Islam, and his teachings are widely admired by other religious traditions.

Jesus was born in Bethlehem, Judea – then part of the Roman Empire, under the rule of Herod. Jesus was born into a Jewish family; his parents were Mary and Joseph of Nazareth. Jesus was born in Bethlehem because his father had to travel to his place of birth to take part in the Roman census Because of over-crowding due to the census, the family were offered a place in a stable, and hence Jesus was born in the humblest of surroundings – in a manger surrounded by animals.

Not much is known about Jesus' early life, the Gospels concentrate on the last couple of years when he was active in his ministry. However, Jesus is believed to have followed in his father's footsteps and trained to be a carpenter. Following his baptism, Jesus spent 40 days in the desert where he was tempted by the Devil. However, he passed the test and refused any temptations of wealth or worldly gain. He was beaten and taunted by soldiers and some in the crowd. Many others were weeping at the sight of Jesus being taken to his execution. He had to carry a cross and at one stage fainted – and was helped by Simon of Cyrene.

Jesus was nailed to the cross with an inscription above his head. "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews" (INRI). He was crucified in between two thieves. Jesus died on the cross, with a Roman soldier puncturing his side with a spear to prove that he was dead. The Gospels relate that on the Sunday following the crucifixion, Mary Magdalene visited the tomb of Jesus to find it empty. His disciples come to realise that Jesus had risen from the dead. Though disciples like Thomas doubted Jesus' resurrection until he saw Jesus Christ in the flesh.

The tree's triangle shape represents the trinity, and it symbolizes Christ and new life.



Bells symbolize the joy of Christmas and reminds us that Christ is the High Priest.

Food for the Soul

North Carolina's Black-Eyed Pea and Collard Greens Soup

Ingredients:

2 cups dried black-eyed peas, Soak overnight and drained 1 bunch collard greens, washed and chopped 1 large onion, diced 3 cloves garlic, minced 1 smoked ham hock or 1 cup diced smoked ham 1 can (14.5 oz) diced tomatoes 6 cups chicken broth or vegatable broth 1 tsp smoked paprika 1/2 tsp crushed red pepper flakes (optional for a bit of heat) salt and pepper to taste 1 tbsp apple cider vinegar 2 tbs olive oil

Instructions:

In a large pot, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the diced onion and soute' until it becomes translucent, about 5 minutes. Add the minced garlic and cook for another minute, strirring frequently to prevent burning.

Add the smoked ham hock or diced ham to the pot, letting it sear slightly to release its flavors. Stir in the soaked black-eyed peas, diced tomatoes, smoked paprika, and crushed red pepper flakes (if using).

Pour in the chicken broth, bring the mixture to a boil, and then reduce the heat to low. Cover the pot and let the soup simmer for about 45 minutes, or until the black-eyed peas are tender.

Once the peas are cooked, add the chopped collard greens to the pot. Stir well to combine and cook for another 15 minutes, or until the greens are tender but still vibrant in color.

Season the soup with salt, perrer, and apple cider vinegar to taste. The vinegar adds a delightful tang that enhances the flavors of the greens and peas. Serve hot, with a side of cornbread or a slice of crusty bread.
